



Holiday Mail for Heroes Card Making Party

What it is Holiday Mail for Heroes is an annual campaign where the American Red Cross affords Americans the opportunity to send messages of thanks and holiday cheer to military members, veterans, and their families.

During this party, gather Red Cross Club members and friends and family to make cards with kind messages to show your gratitude for their service.

How it helps Sending holiday cards to American military members, veterans, and their families not only allows communities to express gratitude, but also provides an opportunity to “give something that means something” to service members and a comforting message to their families and our veterans.

Get started Before beginning, contact your local Red Cross chapter or Service to Armed Forces (SAF) station for assistance. You can search for your local chapter by zip code on redcross.org – when you call the chapter, ask to speak to someone who works with youth volunteers. They will be able to guide you to available resources that can make this an impactful and successful event. Once you have established contact with your chapter, there are three steps you should complete:

- 1.** Decide on a date, time, and location. Community centers and school auditoriums make for good locations. Every year, cards are collected between the first week of October and the first week of December, and distributed in time for the holidays - plan your party accordingly. Make sure to use the U.S. Postal service to send cards before the deadline to ensure delivery. Be sure to view the “Checklist” resource for the exact deadline date.
- 2.** Spread the word! Invite people to attend the party by creating flyers and sharing the invitation on social networking sites. Encourage people to bring friends and family to participate.
- 3.** Gather the necessary materials. Budget the cost of supplies (postage, cards, construction paper, markers, etc., but no glitter) and encourage participants or fellow Red Cross Club members to bring their own creative decorations. Be sure to review the “Checklist” resource for card making guidelines. Provide food, beverages, and fun background music. Ask local restaurants if they will donate food for the party.

What's Next?

- Recruit volunteers to help on the day of the party. They can help set up card making areas and distribute card making materials.
- Create a schedule to help maintain order, especially if the party involves a large group of people. Make sure to schedule plenty of time to set up and clean up.
- This is a great time to encourage participants to donate to the Red Cross. Set up a donation station with a laptop so people can make online donations or use an envelope to collect cash donations. Tell participants the money goes to where the need is greatest, including funds for responding to local disasters like home and apartment fires.
- Ask the local chapter to provide materials with information about the Red Cross to distribute. Set up a "Learn More" station where participants can learn about other Red Cross volunteer opportunities and how to support the mission. Remember to invite staff and volunteers from your local chapter to attend.

Your party is not complete until you send in the cards. The "Checklist" resource provides the address to send the completed cards - make sure to send using U.S. Postal service before the deadline.

Remember to thank all participants for their help! Through this party, participants are able to thank our troops, socialize with fellow peers, and help the American Red Cross fulfill part of its mission to serve the Armed Forces. Shake it up!

- » Incorporate card making into other Red Cross events. For example, at a community fair, have a section of the booth devoted to making cards.
- » Host a contest and allow participants to vote on different categories for cards. Most creatively decorated card, most thoughtful message, most colorful card, etc. Give small rewards like \$5 gift cards to winners, as an incentive.
